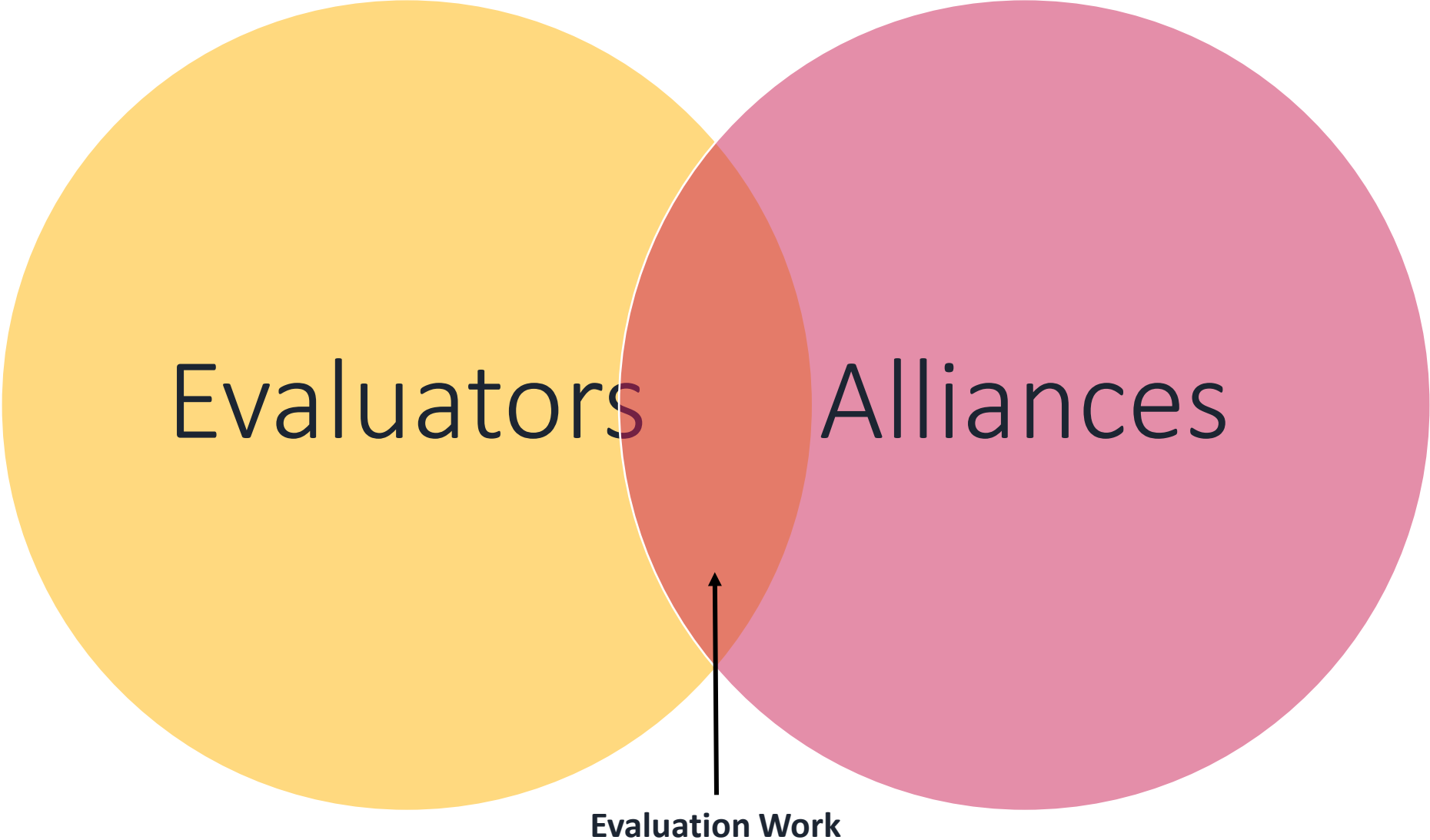
# ECBC Goal

Increase the capacity of evaluators to produce high quality, culturally responsive, contextually relevant, methodologically appropriate evaluations of AGEP Alliances.

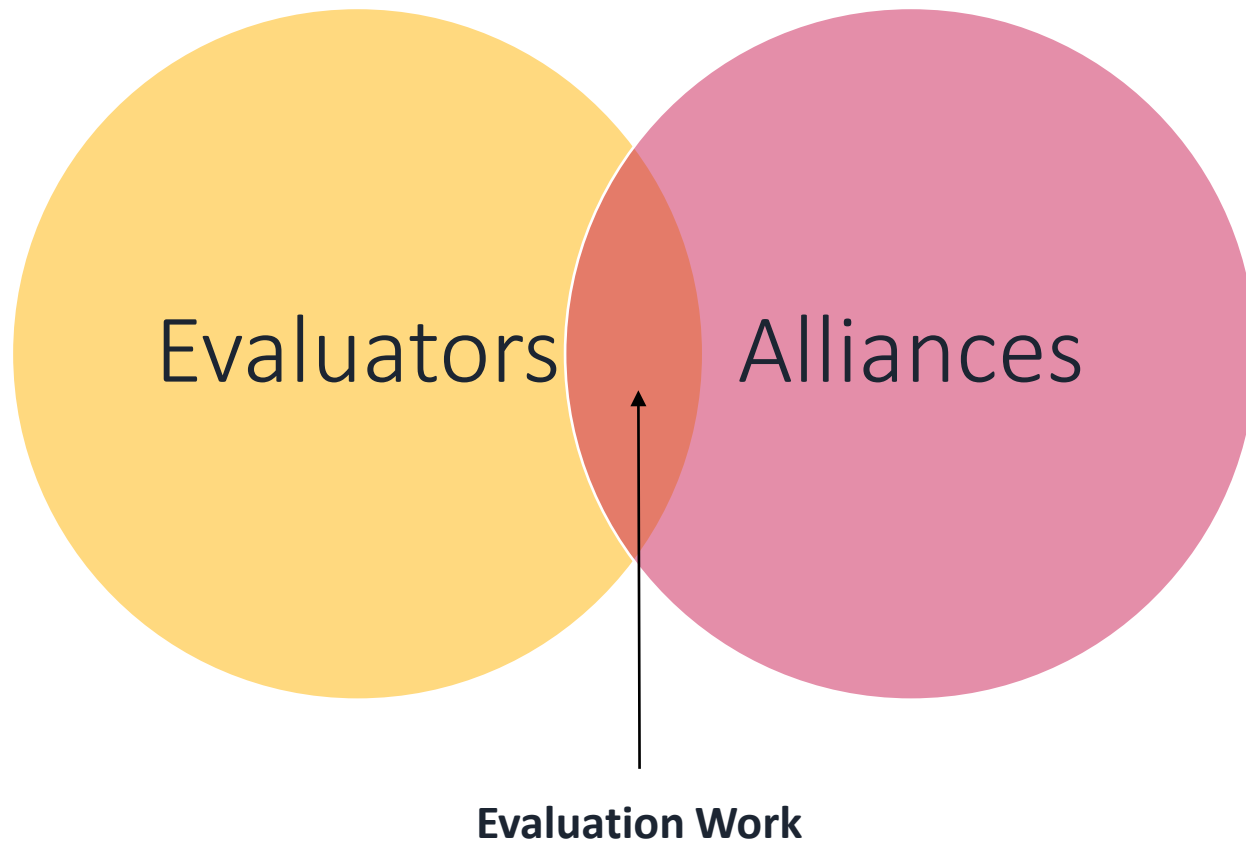

# Roles

Why is it important to clarify roles?

- To ensure PIs and evaluators are on the same page about the evaluation
- To decide the extent of involvement for evaluation work
- To clarify expectations and set boundaries of the partnership
- To establish and maintain transparency
- To know how to interact with team members

"An evaluator's role is not self-claimed; rather it is defined by the things an evaluator does during the evaluation."

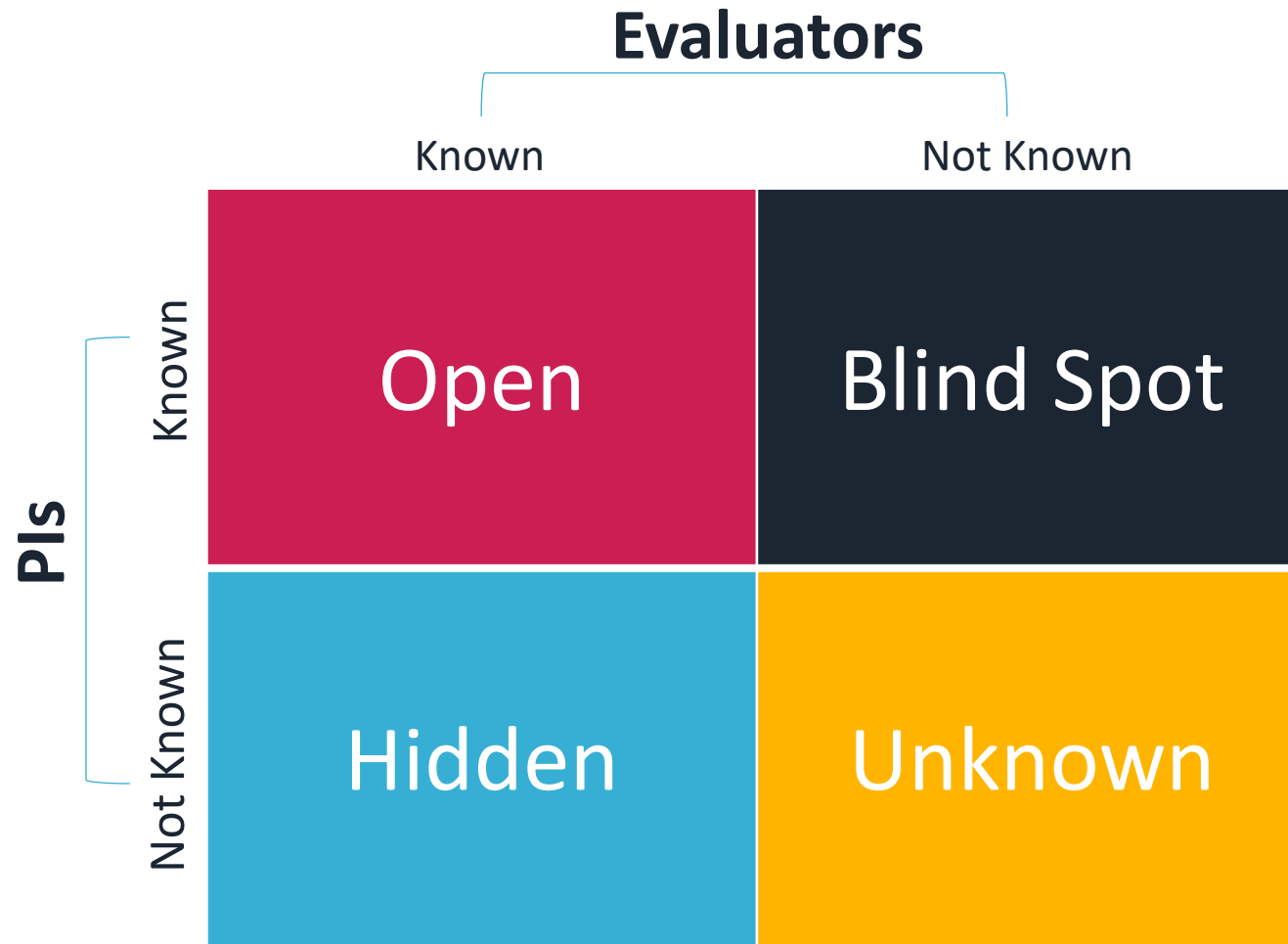

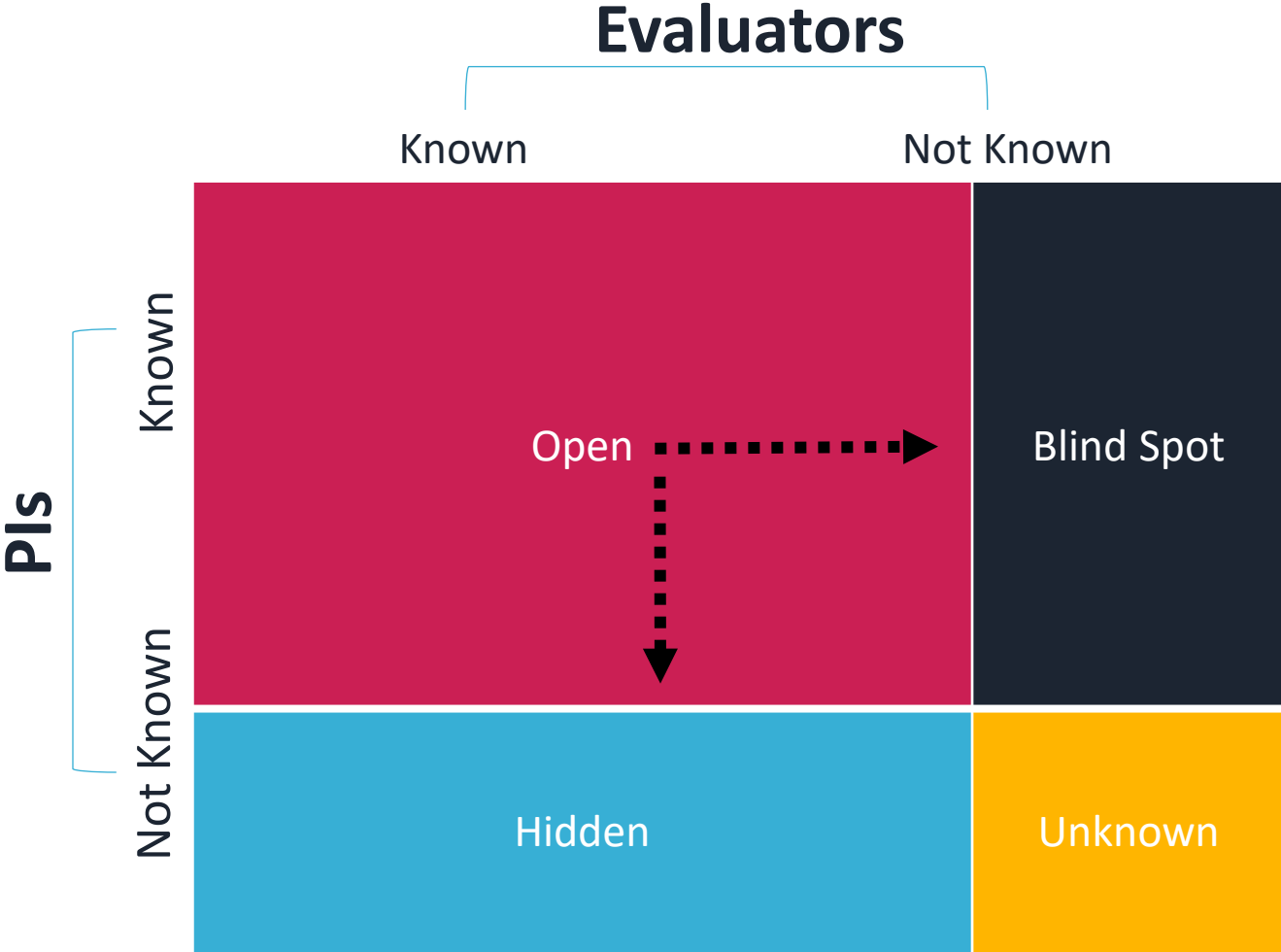

# Introducing the Johari Window: Partnership Starting Point

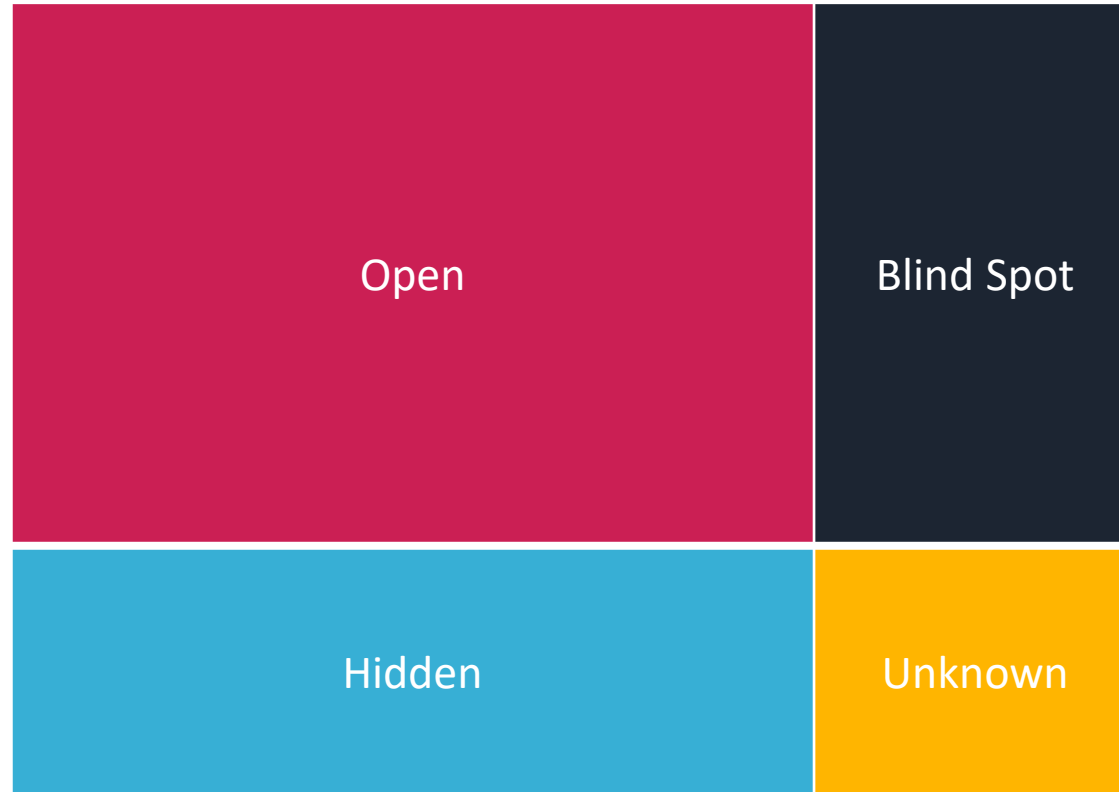


# Partnership Goal

# Johari Window: AGEP Example

Component	Description	AGEP Example
Open	skills and behavior known to all partners	Evaluation expectations that evaluators and PIs agree on
Blind Spot	skills and behavior that are known by your partners but not known by you	Evaluation expectations that PIs have that are not explicit or clear to evaluators
Hidden	skills and behavior known by you but unknown to your partners	Evaluation expectations that evaluators have that are not explicit or clear to PIs
Unknown	skills and behavior unknown to you and others	Evaluation expectations that neither Evaluators or PIs have (things there are questions about)

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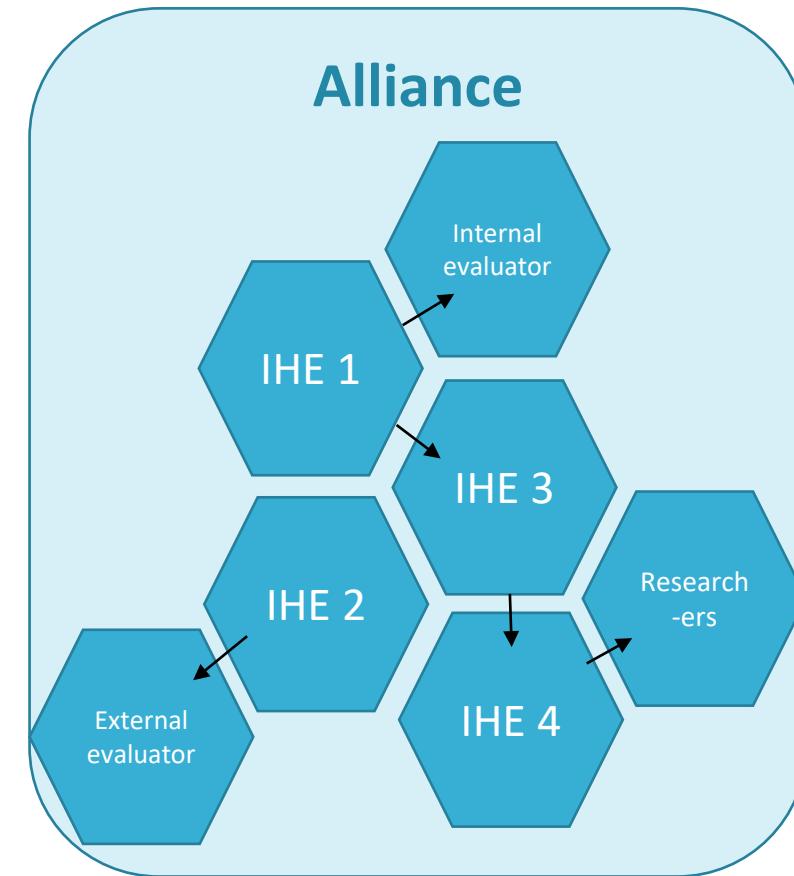

# Communication in evaluation work

- Communication is ongoing – before, during, and after an evaluation
- Think back to the Johari window...
  - Do you have shared ideas about when and how the Alliance and evaluator(s) communicate with each other?
  - Do you know who needs to be included in communications? Who is responsible for communicating?



*The single biggest problem in communication is the illusion that it has taken place.*

# Effective communication supports high quality evaluations

- Builds acceptance of the evaluation among those whose participation is key
- Enables access to audiences for data collection and/or to other relevant data sources
- Allows for feedback on preliminary findings, including context and insights to help interpretation

"Intentional conversations and planning documents can help align expectations for evaluation activities, deliverables, and findings."

# Evaluation Use

- Evaluation use is an extension of evaluator role and communication
- Evaluators can:
  - Facilitate dialogue to interpret findings
  - Communicate to a range of audiences and stakeholders
  - Co-create recommendations that are responsive and feasible



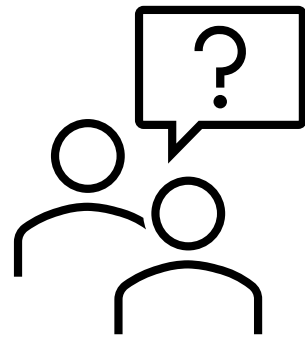
# Evaluation use through partnership



Partnership can help to avoid evaluation use pitfalls.

- Use does not have to wait until the end of an evaluation! Use can—and should--happen along the way and throughout an evaluation.
- A strong partnership helps ensure full use of findings, including difficult or negative ones.
- Evaluators are committed to and passionate about the goals of the AGEP program and want Alliances to succeed. Use them!
